
How do we encounter the Risen Christ today?

This Eastertide, let us commit ourselves to a deeper contemplation of these holy mysteries. May our hearts be open to seeing, feeling, and embracing the presence of the Risen Lord in all aspects of our parish worship and in the quiet moments of our personal prayer.

To truly live and act as a child of God amidst the world involves a journey that encompasses personal character development, prayer, work, virtue, and apostolate. Each aspect is interlinked, creating a whole approach to embodying one's faith in daily life.

Personal Character: The foundation of a Christian life is personal character, marked by integrity, humility, and love. It begins with a deep internalization of one's identity as a beloved child of God, reflecting His love in interactions with others. Personal character is shaped by the fruits of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Developing these traits allows one to mirror Christ in everyday situations, setting the stage for a life lived in accordance with God's will.

Prayer: Prayer is the lifeline of the Christian life, a means through which one cultivates a personal relationship with God. It involves both speaking and listening, allowing for guidance, strength, and comfort from the Holy Spirit. Regular prayer, whether through personal meditation, reading scripture, or corporate worship, nurtures faith and aligns one's will with God's. It is through prayer that one finds the grace to navigate life's challenges and the inspiration to live out one's vocation.

Work: Work is not merely a means to an end but a form of service to God and neighbour. Approaching work with diligence, excellence, and a spirit of cooperation reflects the Christian calling to stewardship and love. By seeing work as a divine calling, Christians can transform their tasks into offerings to God, contributing to the common good and sanctifying daily life.

Virtue: Living a virtuous life is central to being a child of God. Virtues such as faith, hope, charity, justice, prudence, temperance, and courage are essential markers of Christian life. These virtues guide moral conduct, decision-making, and interactions with others, fostering a character that is consistent with the teachings of Christ. Cultivating virtue requires ongoing effort, self-examination, and reliance on God's grace.

Apostolate: The apostolate, or Christian mission, involves sharing the love and truth of the Gospel through word and deed. This could manifest in evangelization, acts of service, advocacy for justice, or simply living out one's faith authentically in everyday life. Engaging in the apostolate means recognizing one's unique role in God's plan and participating in the mission of the Church to bring about the Kingdom of God on earth.

IN LOVING MEMORY OF BISHOP ELECT MARTIN CHAMBERS (aged 59)



With heavy hearts, we share the news of the untimely passing of Bishop Elect Martin Chambers, who departed peacefully in his sleep on the eve of April 10, 2024.

PRIESTLY BLESSING (Numbers 6:24-26)

The famous blessing from is often used in the liturgy and in the spiritual life of many Christian traditions. *It reads as follows:* "May the Lord bless you and keep you. May the Lord shine his face upon you and may he have mercy on you. May the Lord turn his face toward you and may he give you peace."

MAY THE LORD BLESS YOU AND KEEP YOU:

- "May the Lord bless you and keep you." This phrase expresses the request that God bestow his blessing on a person, which in the biblical context means not only material well-being, but above all spiritual well-being, grace, care, and the presence of God in the life of a person.

and the presence of God in the life of a person. - "and let him guard you" – this part of the verse adds a dimension of protection. The request for God's protection alludes to the desire to be safe from evil, danger, and harm. In the biblical context, God's watchful eye is understood as watchful care, which encompasses both the physical and spiritual aspects of life.

MAY THE LORD SHINE HIS FACE UPON YOU AND HAVE MERCY ON YOU: - "May the Lord shine his face upon you" – this phrase is a

- "May the Lord shine his face upon you" – this phrase is a metaphor that describes God's grace and favour. The brightening of the countenance symbolizes God's closeness, His positive, gracious attitude, as well as the abundance of graces and blessings flowing from Him. - "and may you have mercy" – here the request is about Cod's mercy, which means readings to forging compare

- "and may you have mercy" – here the request is about God's mercy, which means readiness to forgive, compassion and treat kindly, despite human weaknesses and mistakes. This phrase emphasizes God's willingness to be kind and forgiving.

MAY THE LORD TURN HIS FACE TOWARD YOU AND GIVE YOU PEACE:

- "May the Lord turn his face toward you" – like the previous phrase about brightening the face, this phrase speaks of God's favourable gaze, which is a source of protection and grace. Turning one's face towards someone is a gesture of intimacy, commitment and personal care.

- "and may he give you peace" – peace, in the biblical context, is one of the deepest blessings. It includes not only the absence of conflict or war, but also fullness of well-being, harmony, security, and spiritual contentment. This blessing of peace is the culmination of a request for God's blessing, concluding the blessing with a vision of the complete, all-encompassing prosperity that God desires for man.

61st WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

Pope Francis's message emphasizes the Christian journey as one of hope, synodality, and a collective quest for peace and love under God's guidance. Set against the backdrop of the theme "Called to Sow Seeds of Hope and to Build Peace," the Pope's reflections invite Christians to ground their lives in the resurrection of Christ.

Celebrated on April 21 this year, the World Day of Prayer for Vocations calls upon the faithful to anticipate their ultimate calling every day.

This anticipation is seen as a step towards realizing God's vision of a united human family characterized by love, cooperation, and brotherhood.

The Pope underscores the synodal nature of this journey, highlighting the Church's diversity of charisms and vocations as a strength that facilitates mutual listening and collaborative progress.

The 2025 Jubilee Year's theme, "Pilgrims of Hope," further aligns with Pope Francis's vision of the Christian pilgrimage as a transformative and regenerative journey. By emphasizing the importance of carrying only what is essential and shedding all forms of weariness and fear, the Pope invites the faithful to discover God's love anew each day.

This journey, marked by continual beginning and the pursuit of new horizons, is also a process of self-discovery enriched by community and relationships.

Pope Francis's message resonates with a call to action for today's youth, especially those who may feel disconnected or wary of the Church. FAMILY CONNECTION


Family life is strengthened through storytelling and shared mealtimes. In a similar way, Christian life is sustained by God's word in Scripture and by Christ's presence in the Eucharist. We are especially sustained in our faith through our weekly celebration of Mass. Today's Gospel reading reminds us that the Scripture and the Eucharist are given to us so that our acts of bearing witness to Christ might be strengthened.

As you gather as a family, ask each person to share their favorite story about your family. Talk about the importance of these memories about your family life and the importance of the meals you have shared together as a family. Recall that these stories and meals strengthen the love you share. In a similar way, our Christian life is strengthened by sharing God's Word and the Eucharist at Mass. Read together today's Gospel, Luke 24:35-48. Discuss the mission that Jesus gave to his disciples after their shared meal.

The Eucharist also sends us to be Christ's witnesses in the world today. Conclude by praying together that we will be strengthened by God's word and by Jesus' presence in the Eucharist to be witnesses to Christ. Pray together today's psalm, Psalm 4.

PRAYER FOR LIFE 14th (3rd Sunday of Easter) - On Monday, we celebrated the feast of the Annunciation of the Lord, the day we commemorate when the Lord Jesus took on human flesh and Our Lady said 'Yes' to God.

We pray for pregnant women who feel they are facing a difficult deci-sion. We ask that they may be given hope, filled with the love of God, and guided away from a course of despair and onto one of love and acceptance of the gift of life. Lord hear us.
